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Floral depictions have found expression in art for centuries. When they first decorated books, emerged as sculptures or architectural elements, flowers became more and more an independent pictorial motif and reached a climax with the genre of the flower still life in the Baroque period. But even the advent of abstract art in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the "flower painting" has not disappeared from art, but still provides inspiration and shows how complex and profound the subject is. Flowers are represented not only in numerous art forms, but the different human appreciation of flowers are also expressed in various themes and representations: from scientific, ornamental and architectural studies, as well as decorative elements up to the flower as a symbol for central themes of humanity such as love, eroticism, transience, death or freedom. There is hardly a living thing in nature that delights man so much and serves him as a projection screen for myths, fairy tales, religion and world of thoughts, as a flower.
